

WHAT IS NOT LEGAL TO DRIVE ON THE STREET?

Go-Carts, Golf Carts, All-Terrain Vehicles (three or four-wheel ATV's), "Mini motorcycles", or motorcycles designed for off-road use, or any other "play vehicle", whether powered by an electric motor or gas engine, cannot be legally operated on city streets or highways in the State of Oklahoma.

A license plate on a motorized device DOES NOT make it street legal to operate. The size of the vehicle, the engine size, DOT approved equipment and insurance requirements dictate what can legally be operated on public roadways. Contact local law enforcement if you have any questions.

Any adult violating this law in the City of Broken Arrow can be cited for violating Broken Arrow City Ordinance 23-21.

Any parent/guardian of a minor 17 years of age or younger who is observed in violation of this ordinance can be issued a citation.



OTHER IMPORTANT FACTS

- ❑ According to Broken Arrow City Ordinance 23-79, a motor vehicle propelled by gas or electric power cannot be operated on a sidewalk.
- ❑ Any person driving or riding a motorcycle, motor driven cycle, ATV or electric-assisted bicycle under the age of 18 years old is required to wear an approved helmet.
- ❑ No person under 16 years of age shall drive a motorcycle, motor-driven cycle, motorized scooter, motorized bicycle or an electric assisted bicycle on any public street while transporting another person.

ASK QUESTIONS!

Before purchasing a motorized device, read warning labels, ask the retailer or contact local law enforcement to determine if the device is street legal!

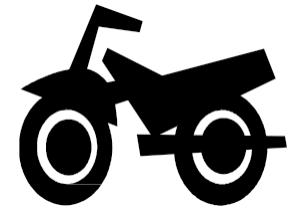

MOTORCYCLES



A motorcycle:

- ❑ Has an engine size greater than 150 cc.
- ❑ Has a saddle or seat for each rider.
- ❑ Is designed for 2 or 3 wheels.
- ❑ Must be licensed and insured.

Who can ride a motorcycle?

- ❑ Driver must be 16 years old or older with a valid license and motorcycle endorsement.
- ❑ A person 14 years of age can apply for a restricted motorcycle license if the motorcycle engine size does not exceed 250cc.

MOPEDS



A moped is:

- ❑ Not capable of speeds in excess of 30 mph with an engine no larger than 50cc.
- ❑ Equipped with a power drive system which functions directly or automatically without clutching or shifting by the operator after the drive system is engaged.
- ❑ Must be licensed and insured.

Who can ride a moped?

- ❑ Driver must be 16 years old or older with a valid license and motorcycle endorsement
- ❑ A person 14 years of age can apply for a restricted motorcycle license.

MOTOR-DRIVEN CYCLES

A motor-driven cycle:

- ❑ Has a combustion engine greater than 35 cc and less than 150 cc, or electric motor with a power output greater than 1,000 watts.
- ❑ Has a saddle or seat for each rider.
- ❑ Is designed for 2 or 3 wheels.

Who can ride a motor-driven cycle?

- ❑ Driver must be 16 years old or older with a valid license and motorcycle endorsement.
- ❑ A person 14 years of age can apply for a restricted motorcycle license.
- ❑ A motor-driven cycle cannot be operated at speeds greater than 35 mph.

MINI BIKES



A mini bike is:

- ❑ Any self-propelled vehicle or motor-driven cycle that is factory designed with:
- ❑ Less than an eight-inch wheel rim,
- ❑ Less than a forty-inch wheel base, or
- ❑ Less than a twenty-five-inch seat height.

Who can ride a mini bike?

- ❑ Anyone can ride a mini bike, as long as it is NOT ridden on the streets or sidewalks.
- ❑ A mini bike cannot be registered or legally operated on the streets.
- ❑ “Mini bikes”, “Mini-motorcycles” or “Pocket bikes” are NOT legal to operate on city streets or highways.

SCOOTERS



A motorized scooter:

- ❑ Shall have no more than three wheels’ in contact with the ground.
- ❑ Has a handlebar and a foot support or seat for the rider.
- ❑ Incapable of speeds greater than 25 mph on level ground, electric power output of not more than 1,000 watts or engine size greater than 35 cc.

Who can ride a scooter?

- ❑ Anyone can ride a scooter, as no driver license or insurance is required.
- ❑ May be restricted from use on sidewalks in some jurisdictions, such as Broken Arrow.
- ❑ Must be ridden under the same regulations as a bicycle.
- ❑ Cannot be operated on streets that have a speed limit greater than 25 mph.

ELECTRIC ASSISTIVE MOBILITY DEVICE

What is an electric personal assistive mobility device?

- ❑ Is self-balancing on two



non-tandem wheels.

- ❑ Is designed to transport one person in a standing position.
- ❑ Has an electric propulsion system.
- ❑ Can be ridden on the sidewalk, unless prohibited by City Ordinance.
- ❑ Cannot be ridden on city streets, unless in an area where no sidewalks are provided.
- ❑ Includes electric or motorized wheelchairs.

ELECTRIC ASSISTED & MOTORIZED BICYCLES



An electric assisted bicycle:

- ❑ Two or three-wheeled bicycle with saddle or seat for the rider.
- ❑ Has an electric assist motor and fully operative pedals for human power.
- ❑ Incapable of speeds greater than 20 mph on level ground with no more than 1,000 watts’ electric output power.
- ❑ The motor disengages or ceases function when the brakes are applied.

Who can ride an electric assisted bicycle?

- ❑ Must have a valid driver license to drive on public streets, but are exempt from a motorcycle endorsement or insurance.

A motorized bicycle:

- ❑ Has fully operative pedals for human propulsion, automatic transmission and engine size of 50 cc or less and incapable of speeds of not more than 30 mph on level ground.

Who can ride a motorized bicycle?

- ❑ Must have a valid driver license to drive on public streets, but are exempt from a motorcycle endorsement or insurance.
