The Broken Arrow Fire Department welcomed seven new firefighters during a graduation ceremony for Fire Academy 219 in June. The new firefighters filled positions that were open as a result of retirements that have occurred over the last year.

The cadets went through four months of training with BAFD and are now serving the residents of Broken Arrow.

The seven new firefighters are Garret Blocker, Tyler DeSmet, Dylan Delso, Bryan Jeffus, Chris Rivera, Eric Schraeder and Jacob Tidwell.

Also in June, BAFD placed two new fire apparatus into service with a traditional washing in ceremony at

A washing in ceremony involves firefighters (and citizens) wetting the new trucks and pushing them into the station. This tradition dates back to the 1880s when horse-pulled pumpers



were the fire apparatus of the day. When the horses and pumpers returned to a station from a fire, both would be backed into the station, washed down and readied for the next emergency.

BAFD's two new \$1 million ladder trucks replace older trucks at Stations 2 (near Aspen Avenue and the Creek Turnpike) and 6 (near Nienhuis Park). One truck was funded by General

Obligation (GO) Bond funds and the other with Sales Tax Capital Improvement (STCI) funds.

Ladder 6 replaces an 11-year-old ladder truck that will be placed into reserve service. The current Ladder 2 is 10 years old and will move to Station 1 (at Kenosha and Main Streets) to replace the 24-year-old Ladder 1.

Paws on Patrol keeps community safe

The next Broken Arrow Police Department Paws on Patrol, a dog walker watch program, will be held at 7 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 11, at the Public Safety Complex, 1101 N. 6th St.

The program is a community awareness and crime prevention program you can take part in while walking your dog. BAPD invites residents to join and assist the department as an extra set of eyes in the

community. This training is for humans only and you do not need a dog to participate.

Dog Walker Watch is an awareness program sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch. This program is designed for neighbors who are familiar with their community and are out in the neighborhood on a regular basis, with or without a dog. Unlike a community watch program, Dog Walker Watch requires no commitment beyond an individual's regular routine of a daily walk.

BAPD's Crime Prevention Unit will host a free training session for those interested in joining:

• The training sessions provide residents with the skills and abilities needed to become more aware of their surroundings and learn when to report

suspicious activity.

Renew intrusion alarm, pet permits by Sept. 30



September is National Preparedness Month

National Preparedness Month is an annual reminder that natural and man-made disasters can strike at any time. Having a planned response when you're at home, work or on the road can make all the difference in an emergency.

Many federal agencies, like FEMA, Ready.gov or the National Weather Service, are valuable resources for emergency preparedness. State and local agencies, like the Department of Emergency Management, also have valuable information

regarding risks around Broken Arrow.

When you face an emergency, stay informed through radio, TV or the Internet. In some cases, service disruption may make communication nearly impossible.

The National Safety Council recommends the following general precautions that apply to many disaster situations:

 Have a family communication plan. Review and practice it regularly;

- Write down or memorize all important phone numbers;
- Have an emergency kit in your car and at least three days of food, water and other vital supplies at home;
- Store important documents, like birth certificates or insurance policies, in a fire-proof safe or safety deposit box;
- Learn first aid and CPR; and
- Know how to shut off utilities.
