Main Street Bikeway rolls along

In December, the City Council received an update on the plans for the Main Street Bikeway, which is being administered through the Oklahoma Department of Transportation.

The Bikeway would run north from Washington (91st) Street to Fort Worth Street. There, the bike path will turn east for one block and continue north on First Street to Midway Street. The path again heads east at Midway and turns back north on Fourth Street before connecting to Kenosha (71st) Street.

A connection from the south end of the path to Arrowhead Park is also planned.

The bike path would bring traffic on Main Street between Washington and Houston (81st) Streets from four lanes down to three lanes — one in either direction, plus a center turn lane — with the bike lanes on the outside in each direction.


South of Houston, angled parking spots along Main Street could be converted to back-in parking instead of pull-in. This is a safety measure so drivers pulling out of these streetside parking spots could easily see a cyclist

coming in the bike lane.

No major construction will need to be done to complete the Bikeway; only signage and repainting lanes. The separate bike lanes will likely be painted green in accordance with current nationwide trends. Where bicycles and vehicles will share the road, shared lane markings, referred to as "sharrows," would be painted on the street.

No action has been taken by the City Council as the plans are not yet final, though the plans have been presented to the Traffic Advisory Committee.

The City will hold a public meeting in the spring to gather input from residents about the bikeway. Work on the bikeway is planned to begin this summer.



After the three public input meetings the City held in February, City administrators collected and are reviewing comments from residents. Using the feedback, the project list will be prioritized so that the bond package can be pared down to around \$210 million.

Once that is done, administrators will submit the reduced package to the City Council for review. The Council will likely decide to finalize the package in April or May to present to voters for the Aug. 28 election.

Organized by Keep Broken Arrow Beautiful, the volunteer program establishes partnerships with local businesses, churches, non-profits and individuals to provide volunteer assistance to those citizens who, due to circumstances beyond their control, cannot accomplish basic property maintenance activities. This program helps needy individuals who would benefit from temporary assistance.

Specific criteria must apply to be considered for assistance, and information is included with all initial code letters.

Applicants must demonstrate one of the following to qualify:

- **1.** Physical limitation or medical hardship
- 2. Financial hardship
- **3.** Active military spouse (deployed or TDY, with proof of

deployment)

4. Family hardships (such as death in the family or illness)

Volunteers must sign a waiver with the City, pass a background check and may be interviewed by the City prior to participation.
