Remember to vote on Aug. 28! \$210 million Build Our Future BA **GO** Bond package goes to voters

Polls will be open on Tuesday, Aug. 28 for Broken Arrow voters to decide on the 2018 Build Our Future BA General Obligation (GO) Bond package.

The \$210 million proposed package will keep the City of Broken Arrow's ad valorem rates level. The City of Broken Arrow, like all municipalities in Oklahoma, receives a portion of property taxes only to pay the interest and principle on GO bonds; none can be used for operational expenses. The City's current mill levy is 16.46 mills for GO bond debt. Maintaining that same rate through the retirement of existing debt, the City projects completing the Build Our Future BA program over 10-12 years. Before approving the package for voters, the City Council was committed to a bond package that will NOT raise taxes.

If voters approve the Build Our Future BA GO Bond package, it will be the largest municipal bond issue voters will have considered in the history of Broken Arrow. It includes millions of dollars for streets, stormwater, public facilities, public safety and quality of life projects.

Dozens of projects are included in the package, including:

- Widen Houston (81st) Street from Garnett Road to Aspen (145th)
- Widen 23rd Street (County Line) between Omaha (51st) to Albany (61st) Streets
- Improve intersections on 9th Street (Lynn Lane) near Highway 51
- Improve drainage in neighborhoods
- Construct Fire Station No. 7
- Construct meeting center for veterans
- Construct Senior Citizen Center annex facility
- Various Parks improvements throughout the City

The Build Our Future BA GO Bond is divided into six propositions:Transportation: \$142.6 million

- Public Safety: \$20.4 million
- Quality of Life: \$17.8 million
- Public Facilities: \$16.8 million



Stormwater: \$7.5 million Drainage: \$5.5 million

"Without question, Broken Arrow is one of the best cities in America to live in, work and raise a family. The investments made by the public into the City's infrastructure will have a long-lasting and positive effect on the economy and quality of life in our community," said City Manager Michael Spurgeon. "This has been a long process and we actively sought residents' input at several points along the way, beginning with the citizens survey last fall to several public meetings in the winter and another in the spring. Thanks to all the feedback we received, we believe this bond package includes a wide variety of projects that are a major priority for the people that live in Broken Arrow.'

The City of Broken Arrow has a long history of promises kept and being good stewards of funding for projects. Approving the Broken Arrow GO bond means citizens will benefit from these new projects such as streets, public safety, and parks - with no tax increase.

Broken Arrow continues to grow in both population and commerce. As the City continues to add families and employers, it is critical to aggressively



pursue long-term projects to ensure the City's infrastructure is able to meet the needs of both.

About the department

The Finance Department accounts for expenditures, assets and liabilities, prepares and administers the annual budget, manages the City's investments, processes invoices, monitors the annual capital plan and works with auditors on preparing and presenting the annual audit and

administers the City's Utilities collection program.

The department is located on the south end of City Hall and also includes the utility customer service division. The Finance Department has

22 employees: 11 in the accounting, 10 in utility customer service and one in payroll.

The department provides multiple services to citizens, from managing utility billing and customer service to maintaining the numbers on the



The Finance Department is thoughtful about the community of Broken Arrow and often takes part in local and national drives, such as Red Nose Day in May which aims to end child poverty in the world.

City's OpenGov online financial accountability tool. The finance department ensures the rest of the City operates in a fiscally-responsible manner and that all departments are

good stewards of the public's tax dollars and how they are spent. The prime examples of this stewardship are the annual budget and financial plan and auditing process.

Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Budget highlights and the budget process

The 2019 Fiscal Year (FY2019) began July 1, 2018 and will end June 30, 2019. The Adopted FY2019 Budget and Fiscal Year Financial Plan was \$254.1 million and consists of 27 funds.

The main operating fund is the General Fund which pays for the following areas: Parks, Administration (City Manager, Finance, Human Resources and Legal etc.), Development Services and Streets/Stormwater.

The City has three Enterprise Funds, meaning they are business-like funds that help provide services to the public for a fee. These are:

 Broken Arrow Municipal Authority (BAMA), which operates the City's Utilities (water, sewer, stormwater and sanitation).

- Broken Arrow Economic
 Development Authority (BAEDA),
 which is a Public Trust created to
 promote and encourage development
 of industry, commerce and other
 activities in the City.
- Battle Creek Golf Course, which funds operations of the City's public golf course and its facilities.

Every year, the Finance Department helps the Administration prepare the annual Budget for the City Council to review and adopt. This process begins around November each year and is submitted to the City Council for consideration in May and adopted in June.

The annual budget includes plans of

work for the organization, challenges and opportunities the administration sees for the coming year and the Capital Improvement Program, which makes up large ticket items, maintenance of streets and other infrastructure, parks & recreation facilities and utility department infrastructure.

Did you know that Oklahoma is the last state in the United States that relies solely on sales tax to fund the General Fund operational expenses?

With that in mind, sales tax can be an unreliable source of income and is often difficult to predict. So the FY2019 budget was prepared using only a conservative 1 percent growth rate on sales tax predictions.

Utility billing information

eBilling Notification Available

In an effort to be more sustainable, the City of Broken Arrow offers a program to notify customers their bill is available for viewing online by email.

The eBilling service increases the City's conservation efforts and saves money. To sign up, log on to your Utilities account at BrokenArrowOK. gov/PayMyBill and select "Manage eBilling" under the "Account Information" tab.

In addition to viewing your bills, you can also make a payment utilizing your debit/credit card or bank account.

When you sign up for eBilling, you can still view the monthly Focus newsletter online at BrokenArrowOK. gov/Focus.

Automatic Bill Payment Available

The City of Broken Arrow now invites Utility customers to sign up for Auto Pay.

With Auto Pay, your monthly payment will be automatically deducted from the bank account or credit/debit card you provide.

Customers can enroll online by logging into their Utilities account at BrokenArrowOK.gov/PayMyBill and selecting the "Auto Pay" option.



If you are unable to log in, a plan authorization form is available at BrokenArrowOK.gov/Utilities. Simply return the completed form with a voided check attached to enroll. The Auto Pay will take effect within 30-60 days after the form is received.

Once on Auto Pay, your monthly utility statement will reflect auto draft with the amount due and the date the amount will be deducted from your checking account.

New Phone System in Utilities Recently enhancements have been made to the automated phone system for Utility customers. Now, when opting to speak with someone and there are other customers already on hold, the system notifies callers how many customers are ahead of them and gives the option to enter a number to be called back instead of waiting on hold.

Utility payment drop box

Did you know there is a drop box for Utility payments outside City Hall? It was moved this spring and is now in the parking lot across Dallas Street from the Utility Customer Service entrance of City Hall.

OpenGov online tool offers transparency on City finances

The City of Broken Arrow is committed to honest budgeting, responsible spending, and financial transparency. In this spirit, the City partnered with OpenGov to provide its citizens and stakeholders with an interactive online financial accountability tool.


The City's financial data are automatically uploaded to OpenGov nightly. Currently, three reports are available:

 The Budget vs. Actuals report shows how the City is actually doing based on what was budgeted for the year.

 The Year-to-Date Expenses and Revenues report shows the City's actual expenses or revenues for the current fiscal year.

 The Budgeted Street Projects for Fiscal Year 2018 report shows a map of the City with locations where street projects have been budgeted.

Ambulance savings through your utility bill

LifeRide is an emergency medical services (EMS) program that provides valuable cost savings on emergency medical response and transportation in Broken Arrow.

The program is administered through a subscription service payable through your City of Broken Arrow utility bill.

LifeRide costs only \$5.45 monthly per household for those inside the City limits and \$7.50 per month for those outside City limits but within the fence line.

The program's annual enrollment/ de-enrollment period is scheduled from Aug. 1-31 each year.



The average emergency response and ambulance transport costs up to \$1,500 or more. Insurance may cover a portion of this charge, but subscribers to LifeRide will pay nothing after a claim is submitted to your health insurance provider.

All members of the household who claim the address registered with LifeRide as their primary residence will be covered.
