

Definitions

- **Priority 1 =** Crimes in progress involving life threatening circumstances and situations that produce or are likely to produce serious bodily injury or death to any person.
- Priority 2 = Crimes in progress or that have just occurred, incidents in progress that present the potential for injury or property damage/loss, situations where the suspect is still at the scene or in the area and will elude apprehension or create the potential for injury or property damage if the police do not arrive rapidly, incidents where an officer is needed to secure a scene or witnesses, and incidents where there is a need for crowd control or traffic control which, if not done immediately, would create the imminent potential for injury or property damage/loss.
- **Priority 3 =**Crimes against people that are misdemeanors in progress or that have just occurred, reports of recent felony crimes, suspicious circumstances with no threat of injury, and incidents that do not require an officer immediately, but need investigation, mediation, or intervention.
- **Priority 4 =** Property or service related calls for an officer to respond that cannot be handled by telephone, misdemeanor reports when caller demands officer or when an officer needs to investigate the scene or interview witnesses, and requests for officers that do not require a quick response.





Helped by her eager new assistant, Annelle (who is not sure whether or not she is still married), the outspoken, wise-cracking Truvy dispenses shampoos and free advice to the town's rich curmudgeon, Ouiser, ("I'm not crazy, I've just been in a bad mood for forty years"); an eccentric millionaire, Miss Clairee, who has a raging sweet tooth; and the local social leader, M'Lynn, whose daughter, Shelby (the prettiest girl in town), is about to marry a "good ole boy." Filled with hilarious repartee and not a few acerbic but humorously revealing verbal collisions, the play moves toward tragedy when, in the second act, the spunky Shelby (who is a diabetic) risks pregnancy and forfeits her life. The sudden realization of their mortality affects the others, but also draws on the underlying strength—and love—which give the play, and its characters, the special quality to make them truly touching, funny and marvelously amiable company in good times and bad. This is a beautiful play of extraordinary humor and warmth, and in no way should it tip over into caricature. The Steel in these Magnolias would never give over to that. The family of Truvy's beauty salon (where "There is no such thing as natural beauty") has dealt with death before, and always pulled together stronger in the end. They've covered each other's back with great humor, through thick and thin - but the death of a child is always the toughest of all - it's backwards, a parent should never have to watch a child die. In order for us to be truly moved by this piece, the consequences must be real, and those consequences provide the reason for the fierce cutting humor from each of the characters (even Annelle gets in a chop or two by the end). Character Breakdown

TRUVY JONES - 40ish - Owner of the beauty shop. Truvy knows everybody, and everybody's business. She's a little sweet, a little sassy, and her talent for hair is only outmatched by her big heart. Craves adventure, but has never stepped foot out of her small town.

ANNELLE DUPUY-DESOTO - 19-25ish - Beauty shop assistant. Annelle is a little on the shy side. At the beginning of our story, she's a naive girl whose marriage isn't just on the rocks - it's heading over a cliff. She finds solace in religion and crafting, and family in the women at the salon. CLAIREE BELCHER - 66ish. - Widow of the former mayor. Grande dame

with a love of baseball and other sports. Clairee is the classiest of them all, but she's not afraid to pitch in and use her money and influence to help others. Her sense of humor is a little skewed. Best friend of Ousier (though you'd never know it from the way they snipe at each other). SHELBY EATENTON-LATCHERIE - 20-25ish - Prettiest girl in town, and popular with everyone. Despite or perhaps in spite of her health issues, Shelby is one of the strongest of all the women. She's stubborn, a little selfcentered, but has a giant soft heart. Shelby lights up a room whenever she walks in.

M'LYNN EATENTON - 40-50ish. Shelby's mother. Socially prominent career woman. M'Lynn is just as stubborn and strong as her daughter, with a touch of a controlling nature. It comes out of love, but it can occasionally be overbearing.

OUISER (pronounced "Weezer") BOUDREAUX - 66ish. Wealthy curmudgeon. Acerbic but loveable. Ouiser is everyone's cantankerous older aunt, or the neighbor with the yard that kids are afraid to play in. It all masks a much softer person inside, though it's very rare to peek out.

Best friends with Clairee since the dawn of time.
