SVP of Economic Development attended the BIO "Biotechnology International Organization" Conference in partnership with OKBIO to generate new leads for health care services and medical device manufacturing, June 6-9.

Global Petroleum Show, June 6-9

Director of Existing Business & Energy attended the Global Petroleum Show, June 6-9. The trip included meetings with a major Canadian energy company, several manufacturers as well as a transportation/logistics company. One of the manufacturing companies and the transportation/logistics company have plans to visit the Tulsa region in August in order to assess the viability of new U.S. operations.

IEDC Economic Future Forum, June 12-14

Tulsa welcomed more than 300 economic development professionals from across the nation for the International Economic Development Council's Economic Future Forum. The Chamber worked diligently with the IEDC staff for over a year to make the event a success. Drawing inspiration from the plan Tulsa has for its economic development future - prosperous, skilled, innovative and livable – this forum explored how private sector development, workforce and education, entrepreneurs and small business, and community development are the pillars that support broad-based economic growth and quality of life. In addition, many Tulsa area business and community leaders discussed key sectors that are providing economic growth and high-paying jobs: aerospace and aviation, advanced manufacturing, transportation and logistics, energy, regional headquarters and professional services, health care and more.

America's Small Business Summit, June 13-15

The US Chamber hosted the 2016 America's Small Business Summit, June 12-15 in Washington DC. Chamber Staff attended to network and support our local small businesses receiving awards. Tedford Insurance, The McIntosh Group and Waterstone Private Wealth Management all received the US Chamber Dream Big Blue Ribbon Awards, while Lisa Riley from Pinot's Palette Tulsa Area Studios received the Cornerstone of Mainstreet Recognition Award for her dedicated work in the community and for small business. The Summit featured a variety of sessions focused on areas relevant to small business and expanding their influence. Through networking with other Chamber's across the nation, Chamber staff brought home fresh ideas for small business programming and outreach.

Select USA Investment Summit, June 19-21

The VP of Economic Development attended the third annual Select USA Investment Summit in Washington, D.C., along with Eric Miller, Port of Muskogee and Janet Smith, PSO, as well as representatives from Oklahoma City, Duncan, and the Citizen Potawatomi Nation. As a result of the event, the state generated leads for two active projects, and several other projects with a time line of one to three years.

Chicago Call Trip, June 21-23

The VP of Economic Development led the annual site visit to Chicago, alongside Chelsea Levo, City of Owasso; Eric Miller, Port of Muskogee; John Schaffitzel, MidAmerica Industrial Park; and Janet Smith, PSO. The group hosted eight meetings with a total of 11 site consultants who work a mix of industrial and office projects. Themes from the visit include the importance of maintaining the state's Quality Jobs Program, the continued trend of office projects looking to locate closer to or in downtown areas, and concerns about Oklahoma's education assets, health status, and weather threats. Overall consultants were positive about the region's continued consideration for projects.
