### Definitions

- Priority 1 =** Crimes in progress involving life threatening circumstances and situations that produce or are likely to produce serious bodily injury or death to any person.
  
- Priority 2 =** Crimes in progress or that have just occurred, incidents in progress that present the potential for injury or property damage/loss, situations where the suspect is still at the scene or in the area and will elude apprehension or create the potential for injury or property damage if the police do not arrive rapidly, incidents where an officer is needed to secure a scene or witnesses, and incidents where there is a need for crowd control or traffic control which, if not done immediately, would create the imminent potential for injury or property damage/loss.
  
- Priority 3 =** Crimes against people that are misdemeanors in progress or that have just occurred, reports of recent felony crimes, suspicious circumstances with no threat of injury, and incidents that do not require an officer immediately, but need investigation, mediation, or intervention.
  
- Priority 4 =** Property or service related calls for an officer to respond that cannot be handled by telephone, misdemeanor reports when caller demands officer or when an officer needs to investigate the scene or interview witnesses, and requests for officers that do not require a quick response.

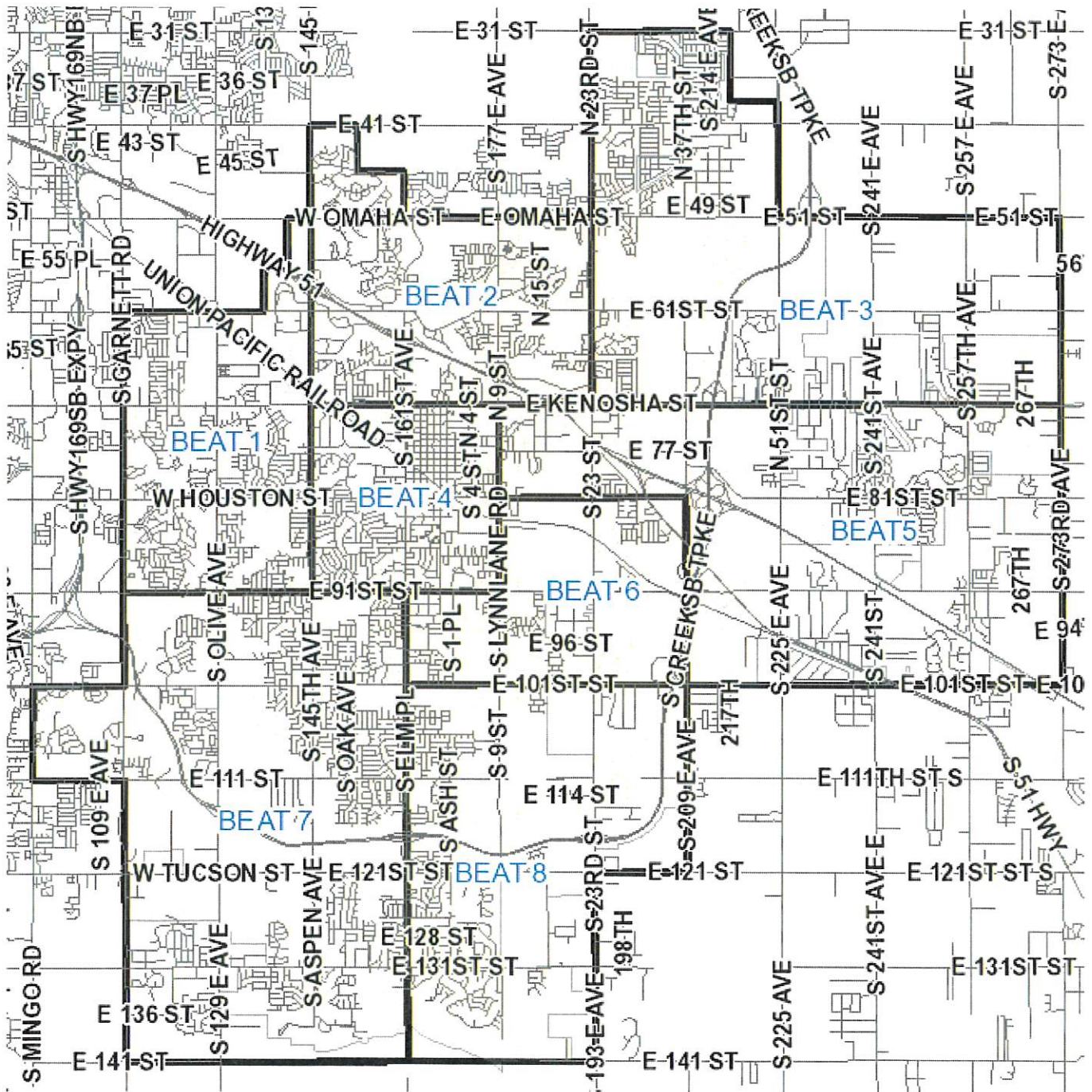

- Priority 5 = Primarily officer-initiated calls or ten-codes used for in-house purposes.
- Priority 6 = Calls for Animal Control Officer response.
- Priority 7 = Calls for Standby Public Works services, i.e., water, sewer, streets, electrician, etc.

### 1863-1952 Marie Louise Bottineau Baldwin

Native American lawyer and suffragist Marie Louise Bottineau Baldwin was a prominent advocate on behalf of Native women and on Native Americans' position in mainstream America. As a clerk in her father's law office, she moved with him to Washington, DC, to help defend treaty rights for their tribe, the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians of North Dakota. 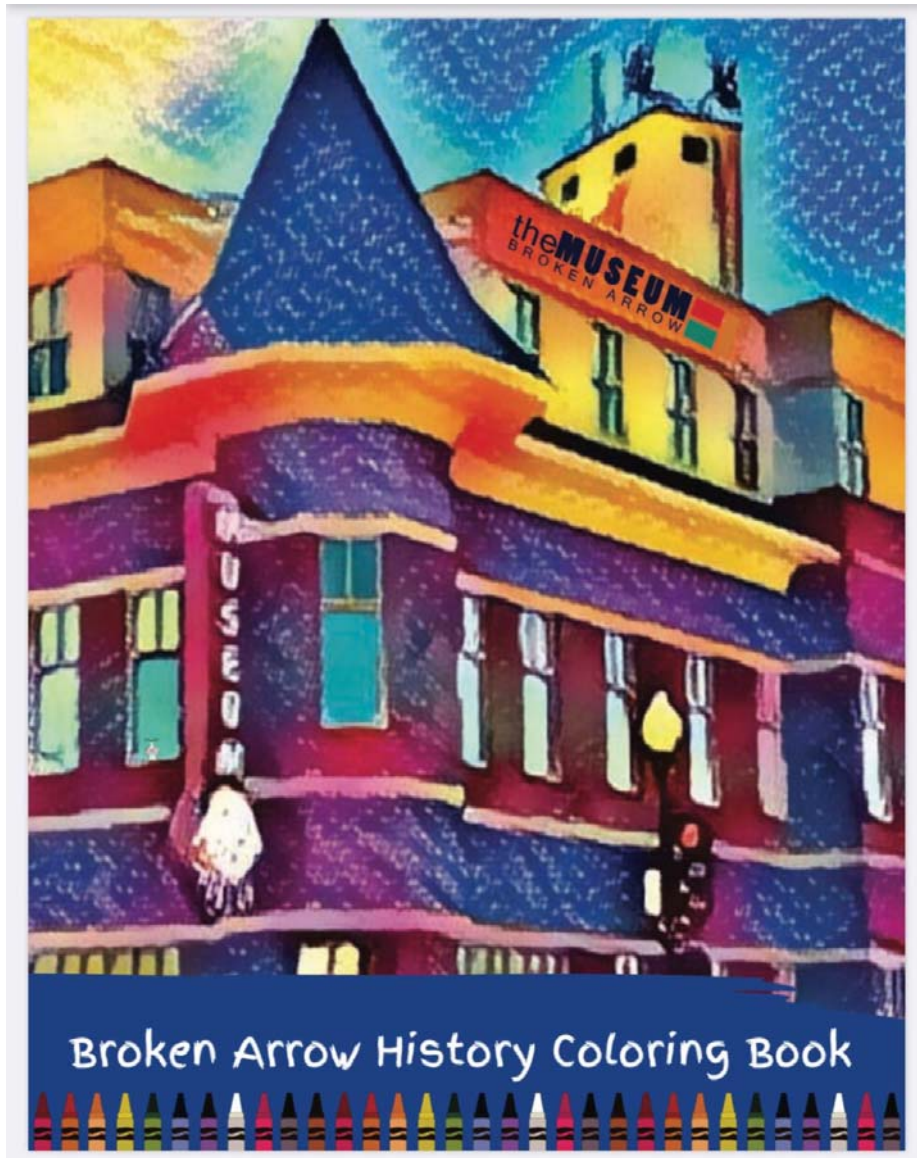

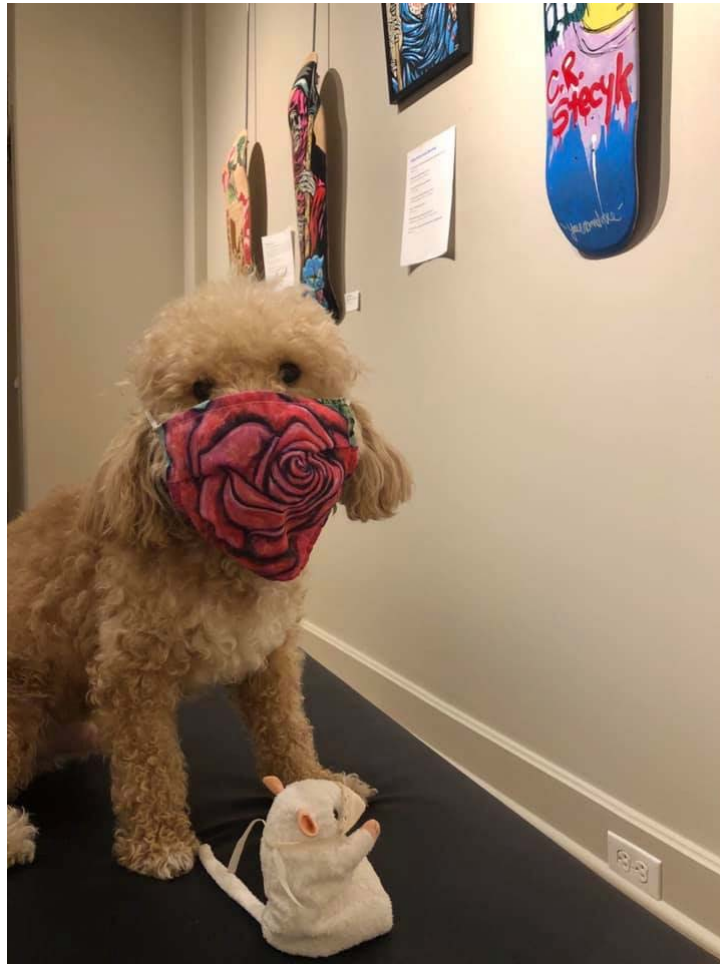

ne Hunsecker

One of Broken Arrow's favorite sons and our Yankee Doodle Dandy although he wasn't exactly born on Independence Day, but he was the composer of the holiday's songs in Summer Holiday starring Mickey Rooney and Gloria de Haven in 1948. He was, however, and July firecracker. Ralph Uriah Hunsecker entered the world in Broken Arrow on July 26, 1914, to parents, T.M. and Florence Wilborn Hunsecker, who recognized his musical talent in his early years. There may be speculation as to whether his talent was innate or learned, but perhaps it was a combination. In the early statehood days, Crystal Theatre was in its hey-day with popular plays, musicals, silent movies until "talkies" came on the scene. Many of these theatrics were accompanied by an organ near the stage. Ralph's mother, Florence, an accomplished pianist and organist, played at many of these performances. As a infant, she would set in Ralph in his carriage, then, in a theater seat as he grew older. "She taught Ralph to sing and play simple melodies" as was shared in the book *Ralph Blane: Oklahoma's Hall of Fame Songwriter (From Hollywood's Gold Age)* by Phyllis Cole Braunlich. His parents, owners of the popular dry-goods store Hunsecker's gave Ralph every opportunity to develop his talents into a career. Broken Arrow was still a small town during his high school years, so his parents allowed Ralph to transfer to Central High School in Tulsa, which had a more advanced music department at the time. Early in his career, he legally changed his name to Ralph Blane Hunsecker, then shortened it even more when as he became a well-known composer in New York City. Ralph Blane is well known for his song "The Trolley Song" a Broadway musical made into a movie *Meet Me in St. Louis*, but especially remembered for "Have Yourself A Merry Little Christmas," both co-written by Hugh Martin. Ralph won many awards throughout his career, and was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame shortly before his death. His father, Tracey M. Hunsecker, Sr. owned several dry good stores in northeastern Oklahoma and his younger brother, who raised registered shorthorn cattle, will both be recognized in the book *Meet the Broken Arrow Centennials*.
