



Who's Who of BA's Past: Mildred McIntosh Childers


A WOMAN AHEAD OF HER TIME
Although Mildred McIntosh Childers did not
experience the Trail of Tears, she came from
hardy stock and a strong Scottish-Muscogee
(Creek) heritage. She was a descendant of
Chief William McIntosh, the head of a Muscogee
(Creek) tribe in Georgia. Mildred and her family
were some of the original native founders of
Broken Arrow. She was taught from a very
young age, that she could accomplish anything

she set her mind to. She was born west of Eufaula, Indian Territory, in 1869, only four years after the Civil War.

Mildred attended Bacone College in 1885 and Carlisle College in 1891. She also attended college in Texas. She taught at Eufaula High School until she married Daniel Boone Childers in 1898. While her Father, Roley McIntosh III, was the Second Chief of the Creek Nation, Mildred became the private secretary for Creek Principal Chief Isparhecker, 1895-1899. Mildred often shared one of the most important days in her life was when Chief Isparhecker had been called to Fort Smith by Judge Isaac C. Parker on tribal business. Her father was in Eufaula on business, and could not be located. She was vested with temporary authority to sign papers and to deal with all official matters referred to the Principal Chief by the Creek Council then in session. She was the only woman ever so honored by the Creek Nation. Through this experience, Mildred became a very persuasive woman in politics.

In 1903, she was elected secretary of the House of Warriors, defeating David M. Hodge. Mildred was the only woman who had ever held any official position in the Creek National Council. In 1932, she was elected a member of the House of Warriors to serve in the Creek Council. Mildred was among the members of the Committee of Eighteen which compiled the Creek Census. Up until she passed away in 1944, she eagerly engaged in public speaking, always promoting her Muscogee (Creek) heritage. She was also a charter member of the Broken
