


January

No cooling off period here for collections, just hard work! Special shout-out to our friends in streets who kept our roads clear! Thanks folks.

The teams are already picking up the waste in different loads and are ready to RecycleBA as soon as the recycling center opens back up! We are expecting the first 2 or 3 of 5 new trucks soon. Can't wait to see our recycling system take off.



Answer:

An accident waiting to happen! As many people know these are Lithium-Ion Batteries. As much as we love them for powering almost all our small electronics, they are also the culprit of waste facility fires. In a recent EPA study of 64 waste facilities that experienced 245 fires from 2013 to 2020 in 28 different states. The majority were caused by, or likely caused by, these batteries. According to the report, 92 million pounds of these batteries were sold in 2020. That's a lot of potential fires if they are disposed of in the trash or recycle. Help us avoid another tragedy for recycling by taking these items to the HHW facility in Tulsa!


