




AMI/AMR WATER METER PROJECT

The IT Communications team is playing an important role in the AMI/AMR project for wireless meter software. They have arranged and managed the placement and positioning of where the wireless network backhaul will go for all the new wireless technology being put in place by the Water Utilities department. Unfortunately, this past month, the remaining equipment is delayed due to supply chain issues. It is expected to arrive in August 2023, at which point it will be able to be installed.

INCIDENT BREAKDOWN



Cyber security Incidents are watched daily by IT's Cyber Security Engineers. In April, only one incident (New Credentials) was recorded, although the Year-to-date incidents have been across the board.

SOLARWINDS SERVICE DESK

Migration kicked off the end of April to move away from IT's legacy help desk ticketing system to the new Solarwinds Service Desk. This new system will provide great functionality that didn't exist in the legacy system including features for onboarding and offboarding employees, a self-service portal, system inventory management with software versioning, and tools to administrate change management. The IT Help Desk will be completing migration next month with a tentative go live date of June 1st.

GIS DIVISION MGMT CHANGE

The GIS Division, which administrates and runs our GIS systems, has had a change in management. Heather Leader has joined the division as the Manager. She comes from the private sector and has great management experience. It will take a little while for her to get up to speed, but she has already taken an active role on some critical GIS system update project efforts.

GIS ENTERPRISE MIGRATION

The GIS team, along with our professional services vendor CloudPoint, has successfully migrated the GIS servers to new environments. There is one more upgrade step remaining, which will be completed in May.




