

- Albany Street Improvements from 9th to 23rd: STI411 The contractor constructed a dedicated right-turn lane at the southwest corner of the intersection just in time for the start of school. Waterline construction is nearly complete and storm sewer construction continues. The project consists of widening the existing three-lane roadway to five-lanes from 9th Street through 23rd Street, replacement of the existing traffic signal at the intersection of 23rd & Albany, addition of a new traffic signal at 12th Street, and addition of 5' sidewalks on both sides of Albany Street.
- 23rd Street Improvements from Houston to Kenosha: ST0914 The foundation construction for the bridge structure over the BA Expressway made large strides in August. East College Street construction continues, and the road remains closed. Delays are due to material availability for the sanitary sewer. The project consists of widening the existing two-lane roadway to five-lanes from Houston to Kenosha, replacement of the existing narrow two-lane bridge over State Highway 51 with a new 5-lane bridge as well as a new traffic signal at Houston

Kenosha Signal Pole Painting Project: TS23120 - The project consists of painting signal poles black at seven separate intersections along the Kenosha Street corridor (Aspen Ave., Elm Pl., Main, 9th, & 23rd Streets) and intersections near the Rose District (Houston St. and South Main, Washington St. and South Main). Also, three additional intersections will be included as add alternates (Washington St. and Elm Pl., New Orleans St. and Aspen Ave., and Florence St. and Aspen Ave.). This project was originally advertised in May. However, the plans have been revised and the scope expanded to include additional intersections.
