## **Dallas Street Construction to Begin in Downtown Broken Arrow**

Project is part of continuing improvements in the Rose District

**Broken Arrow, Okla.** (9/3/2014) – The improvement of Broken Arrow's downtown streets continues with the construction of W. Dallas Street, which is scheduled to begin this week.

As a result, Dallas between Elm Place to Ash Avenue will be closed intermittently to through traffic while contract crews are working on the road. Access to homes and businesses along the route will be maintained throughout construction. Workers will also need to close lanes between Ash Avenue and Main Street so they can install a new waterline.

Residents approved the Dallas Street improvements as part of the 2011 General Obligation bond. The \$816,000 project is set to be completed in January 2015.

The project involves removing the existing pavement and subgrade of the two-lane asphalt road and adding a concrete pavement with curbs and gutters, along with water line and storm water improvements.

A contractor is also finishing construction on W. Broadway Avenue from Elm Place to Main Street. This is part of the downtown roadway improvements and is another entry point into the Rose District.

"Drivers will experience traveling on some of the smoothest roads in Broken Arrow when they come downtown," said City Councilor Jill Norman. "Excellent roads and ample parking will add to the overall experience when people shop, eat and do business in the Rose District."

New Farmers Market Parking Lot Adds 120 Parking Spaces in Downtown Parking lot increases convenience for Farmers Market and Rose District visitors

**Broken Arrow, Okla.** (9/3/2014) – The City of Broken Arrow has completed a new parking lot that provides additional parking for patrons of downtown businesses in the Rose District and the Farmers Market.

The new parking lot adds 120 new parking spaces, six of which are handicap accessible.

"The new parking lot will make shopping at the Farmers Market a much more convenient experience," said Scott Esmond, Director of Recreation, Parks, Cultural Affairs & Tourism. "With ample parking just less than a block away, patrons can spend more time searching for the best produce rather than the perfect parking spot.

The new lot is located one block west of S. Main Street and is accessible from W. El Paso Street. See attached map for reference.

The new Farmers Market parking lot is open to the public seven days a week, making it a convenient place for Rose District visitors to park as well.

## Tulsa, OKC Mayors meet to plan municipal tax base change

Tulsa Mayor Dewey Bartlett met with Oklahoma City Mayor Mick Cornett on Wednesday to plan a campaign to get the state Legislature to allow cities to diversify their source of revenue.

Municipalities in the state get funding almost solely through sales tax, which the mayors argue leads to instability with the ebb and flow of retail sales. Started by the mayors of the state's two largest cities, Bartlett said he hopes all the mayors in the state will join in the effort.

Wednesday's meeting was in Oklahoma City and included each of the city's finance directors, city managers, other top staff and Oklahoma Municipal League Executive Director Carolyn Stager.

Bartlett said the goal is to educate residents about the problem and to encourage legislation to change it.

Other major cities in other states have a diverse set of funding for their budgets, including property taxes, utility taxes, income taxes and others.

Kansas City, for example, has a \$500 million general fund that gets 41 percent from an earnings tax, 20 percent from a utility tax and 12 percent from property tax.

In comparison, Tulsa's \$260 million general fund is fueled by sales and use taxes, which make up about 65 percent.

Use taxes, similar to sales taxes, are paid for purchases outside the state, which is another focus of the mayors' group since the state is having difficulty collecting use taxes due to Internet purchases.

While the big cities struggle with changing sales tax revenue, smaller cities could crumble if just one store shut down, Bartlett said.

"We made the point that if we don't do anything about this problem in some manner, shape or form there will be cities that will not be able to afford a police department or a fire department," he said.

A more diverse draw of city revenue would mean more stable budgets for city planning, Bartlett said.

Bartlett said there is no specific proposal, but the discussion included possibly asking the Legislature for a study to show the dangers of relying on sales tax.
